August Wilson was named Frederick August Kittel when he was born to a German father and an African American mother in 1945 Wilson was born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA Richards later collaborated with Wilson in New York on Broadway Fences was Wilson's second play to go to Broadway and won him the 1987 Pulitzer Prize for Drama Wilson

The Failure of the American Dream in August Wilson's Fences

August Wilson (1945-2005) was a prominent African-American playwright who wrote 15 plays for which he won many awards To name only a few of the prizes Wilson won, one can refer to a Pulitzer Prize and a Tony Award for his play Fences, and a second Pulitzer Prize for The Piano Lesson Wilson is generally

August Wilson was born Frederick August Kittel on April 27, 1945, in the Hill District community of Pittsburgh, the son of an African American cleaning woman, Daisy Wilson, and a German immigrant and baker, Frederick Kittel, who was mostly absent from Wilson's life Wilson's mother raised him and his five siblings in a two-room,
